Student Services by Randi Kauffman-Long'

Since the beginning of the school year, Student Services has been busy fulfilling requests for both teachers and staff here at Magnolia as well as for staff at our off-campus location, Hope Community Center (HCC). We have fulfilled over 60 student services requests, from laminating, copying, delivering, and shredding to die-cutting letters, washing comforters for staff, and assembling folders for some teachers. For HCC, along with our daily cleaning duties, we have sorted breads and other foods, brought back documents to shred, laminated, laundered linens, and helping to wash and clean their 4 vans. We hope to expand to data entry and other on-site jobs at HCC. We hope everyone has a wonderful winter break and holiday!



David Creath's Class

Mr. Creath's class is on the move. They have been visiting various OCPS Transition sites in order to get some perspective as to what comes next after being in the Bridges Program. OCPS Transition sites are the next step in our student's journey towards employment. At the Transition sites the students work hand-in-hand with the staff at the facility. The student's day starts with a short class and then they work up to 5 hours learning job skills. Many of these Transition sites not only offer valuable on-the-job training but also hire our students!

So far the students have visited two different Transition Sites: Second Harvest & Agristarts. Second Harvest is a charity that helps provide food to those that need it in the Central Florida area. The students went on the grand tour-finding out how they package and prepare food to help those in need. Agristarts is a plant nursery in Apopka that sends out over 300,000 plants a week throughout the world. The students there plant, clean and package the plants. Agristarts actually has the best track record of any of our Transition Sites in hiring our students to permanent positions.

The class will continue these trips in the new year. They will be going to Wonderworks on 1/15 and Health Central Hospital on 1/29. In February they will be going to Health Central Park on 2/19 and Burlington on 2/26. The wide variety of locations gives each student a different perspective as to what's available for the next step of their Transition Journey


Ms. Janet Carattini's class



They place sensors in watches, unwrap, sort, and hang up jewelry, sort men, women, toddler, and youth shoes and place them on racks, sort and put hoppers on hangers according to sizes, as well as pull up the zippers on jackets that are hanging on racks. They also set up The Thrift Store through donations that have been provided and perform vocational skills such as customer service, bagging, sorting, pricing, cleaning, organizing, selling, and cleaning merchandise.
